## To the Parents of Students Who Will Take Level 2 (L2) 12th Grade English IV:

All students who will be taking 12th grade L2 English during the 2021-2022 school year are required to read **two** (2) books from the list of 14 below before the start of school.

During the first week of school, students will be given an assessment which will require students to analyze the novels they have chosen in light of one or more of the elements of fiction. Attached is a graphic organizer that will help you organize important ideas from your chosen novel. Be prepared to hand in the graphic organizer to your English teacher at the beginning of the school year.

- 1. A play by William Shakespeare (choices only pick one from the three if you are choosing a play):
  - a. Hamlet
  - b. Othello
  - c. Much Ado About Nothing
- 2. A Secondary Epic:
  - a. Paradise Lost by John Milton
- 3.  $17^{th} 18^{th}$  Century Novels:
  - a. Gulliver's Travels by Jonathan Swift
  - b. Robinson Crusoe by Daniel Defoe
  - c. Moll Flanders by Daniel Defoe
- 4. Late Eighteenth-Century Britain and the Regency Period
  - a. Pride and Prejudice by Jane Austen
- 5. The Victorian Period
  - a. Great Expectations by Charles Dickens
  - b. Jane Eyre by Charlotte Bronte
  - c. Return of the Native by Thomas Hardy
- 6. Modern and Post Modern Periods
  - a. 1984 by George Orwell
  - b. Brave New World by Aldous Huxley
  - c. Heart of Darkness by Joseph Conrad

The books will be available at a variety of prices through a range of publishers and booksellers. Please obtain the full text, rather than the abridged, for each title. If your child has an available unabridged version of any of these books, the text may be used. The Abington Community Library will have copies available on loan throughout the summer. Students are encouraged to use the library. Upon returning to school in September of 2020, students will be evaluated on their reading of these texts. Students should take notes on the provided graphic organizer and/or annotate text in order to enhance comprehension.

Contemporary selections may contain brief instances of profanity. Parents are encouraged to take part in the process of choosing the best books for their children. Read book jackets and back covers to find the subjects and styles of greatest interest. While the texts should present some challenge to the students, they should also allow for enjoyable reading. Furthermore, these selections will increase the body of literature upon which the students can draw as they learn to analyze ideas and discern meaning. Have a wonderful summer and enjoy reading!
