Welcome Advanced Placement (AP) Seminar,

You have chosen to take *Advanced Placement Seminar* this upcoming year. The emphasis of the class will be for us to engage in cross-curricular conversations that explore the complexities of academic and real-world topics by analyzing divergent perspectives. We will investigate a problem or issue, analyze arguments, compare different perspectives, synthesize information from multiple sources, and work alone and in a group to communicate the ideas we've discovered. To that end, you will be reading, writing, and analyzing several articles and/or resources over the summer in preparation for our first unit on social classes, poverty, and wealth.

Task 3: Pick your favorite article and answer the following essential questions through a much closer reading of the text. In order to prepare for the paper and Socratic Seminar, you will need to gather significant quotations and passages from the readings. A chart can be located on google classroom to support/track your notes; however, complete the essential questions separately in more detailed notes.

Essential Questions to Guide Reading:

- What/Who is the biggest factor in social class?
- What are the various factors that shape one's social class?
- What role should the government play in social class?
- How can bridging the global digital divide lead to a decrease in inequality across the world? How does your ready access (or lack of access) to a computer and the Internet impact your life chances/possibilities?
- How has the social class of your parents and your upbringing influenced your success in school and your professional aspirations?

Task 4: Complete a SOAPStone and a RAVEN worksheet analysis (on GC) for:

- "The official U.S. poverty rate..." by Shawn Fremstad ",
- "Lifeboat Ethics..." by Garrett Hardin (These are posted on Google Classroom), and the
- TEDTalk: America's Forgotten Working Class by J.D. Vance

Task 5: For artwork and cartoons, complete the artwork/cartoon analysis sheet (on GC).

Task 6: In a one-two page paper, answer **ONE** of the following questions:

- 1. Who or what is the most influential factor in determining social class? OR
- 2. What role should the government play in the development of social class?

Use the summer readings as well as any others to argue your response. Paper should be typed, double-spaced and should use the proper **MLA format**; you should also have a Works Cited page. **Please bring a hard copy to class the first day of school.**

• Tasks 1-6 will be compiled in a portfolio folder; this anthology of your summer work will be completed and turned-in during the first week of school.
